With a Little Help From My Friends has opened a Pet Crisis Center in Bellaire. This wonderful facility offers a safe place for pets in true emergency situations that have no where else to go. Many people have already experienced situations where they had no where to turn during an emergency. This can be due to a temporary hospital stay, entering a nursing home, a family member's

death or a home fire. Pet owners may be forced to make a very emotional decision in the midst of an already stressful time. Animals are given love and care while they wait for their owners to overcome their crisis and come back for them. In some cases when they can't be reunited, a new loving home will be found.

The center has rooms for dogs that are 8'x8' with glass doors, each with a dog door that leads out to separate kennels. Cat condo units house cats in a large room for roaming during the day. The units have plexi-glass fronts with separate litter areas. The cat room will soon include a cat door that leads to an outside area for cats with a garden around it for their viewing pleasure. Pets that come in to the Crisis Center together will be housed together. There is also room in the building for smaller pets, such as hamsters and birds.

Unlike traditional type "shelters," this center is not a place where people can drop off their pets. Instead, the Pet Crisis Center will be used to assist Antrim county agencies such as animal control, fire, police, mental health and family services. There are hours for the public to come visit and adopt animals that cannot be reunited with their owner and there are also opportunities for volunteers to help at the center. The center is a resource in helping the public with pet issues and will soon offer classes and workshops for community groups. Future plans include a dog building to house more dogs and more cat housing. The sanctuary property has five acres with more

Veterinary Elder Care

How often should your pet see a veterinarian for a "check-up"? That's a question that everyone wonders. Let's think about some numbers. First, most people go to see their physician once a year or so for a wellness exam (assuming they are healthy and in good shape). But that is people.... how can we compare that to veterinary medicine? Well, pets age much faster than people. If you wait a year between wellness exams, your pet ages 7-10 years during that same time period. A lot can happen in that time!

Animals are susceptible to many of the same age-related conditions as we do. Problems like diabetes, arthritis, dementia, hearing and vision loss, kidney and liver failure plague our older pets just like humans. The cancer rate in some breeds of dogs is 6 times that of humans! Just like with their two-legged friends, our pets get great benefits from early diagnosis and treatment of these conditions. One of the biggest issues faced by pets is obesity. We are seeing obese animals in epidemic numbers. This is a major problem that is the cause of many serious medical conditions which cause untold suffering and early death.

If you were to ask me about the best way to keep an older pet healthy, we would probably talk about these suggestions: 1) Feed your pet a good-quality food, avoiding things they should not eat (no hamburgers, candy bars or ice cream...), 2) Keep your pets moving – exercise is the best way to control obesity (and avoid joint problems, diabetes and even some cancers), 3) Get regular medical wellness exams by your pet's doctor – every six months is a good schedule. Many of you will recognize these suggestions from your own physicians. Why not make a commitment to improving your pet's health? Get them to eat better, spend some time playing with them or taking them for a walk every day, and get them in to the doctor regularly. You might just find yourself leading a healthier lifestyle and enjoying life more too.

From the Front Lines

What an exciting few months I have had working with such a wonderful organization. Since coming on as Center Coordinator in January, I have seen some great progress. Our volunteer numbers have grown and adoptions have gone up. The community support is wonderful and I am very impressed at how the group is growing into a household name in Northern Michigan. Each animal story is as unique as they are, making each day new and exciting. When some animals join the center their story breaks our hearts, but the end result is always worth it! The happy endings are often emotional, as these animals find such amazing forever homes. I'd like to share with you one of those great happy endings.

Animal Control called a couple of months ago to pick up a little Chihuahua mix they had. The little dog was scared and intimidated at the facility by the barking dogs surrounding her. Once she came out of that environment a darling little personality started to show. That day I took photos of her and posted them on Facebook. We always try to find animals a "Forever Home," as soon as we can. By the time I arrived at work the next day I was greeted with some interesting news. A woman had called about the little Chihuahua. This wasn't just a random woman, though.

This woman had been a previous owner of Martini (Tini). She said that she had given her to a retired couple when she moved to California. The understanding was that they would keep her forever. For one reason or another the couple had to get rid of the little dog and she ended up right back at animal control. The original owner had regretted her decision of parting with Martini and wanted to adopt her now. The board agreed that we would like to see Martini returned to her family. After some work on our end and out in California, little Martini took off on an adventure all by herself. In the middle of May she departed Traverse City and flew to L.A.. The trip was smooth and she arrived more than ready to see her family. After lots of kisses, Martini did not leave her family, there was no doubt that she had remembered them from before.

Martini is one of many happy endings I've witnessed since being part of this great organization. She reminds us why the dedicated volunteers at WaLHFMMF wanted a Pet Crisis Center in the first place. Not only have we given these pets a safe haven but the number of happy endings have proven its worth. I am impressed at what such a small community can accomplish if they set their minds to it. I see great things continuing for WaLHFMMF in the future.

Domestic Violence: Insuring a smooth transition for your pets as well as yourself

Phil Arkow, head of the American Humane Association's Human-Animal Bond Center, offers advice for those who wish to leave a violent home but are staying out of concern for pets.

- Include animal welfare-removing or protecting pets-in your escape planning
- Arrange animal foster care in advance through a kennel, sympathetic veterinarian or one of the more than 100 woman's shelters nationwide that help find pets housing. For a shelter, see the Humane Society of the United States Web site, www.hsus.org/ace/20663
- In preparation of potential court battles, establish ownership by gathering such papers as vaccination certificates, vet bills, licenses, and proof of adoption or purchase
- Have photos taken of you and your animals
- Understand that new state laws shield animals belonging to you, your children, even the abuser. As a result you may be able to remove the abuser's pets from the home as well
